Edwin is currently obtaining a second B.A. in Criminal Justice at John Jay College, and will complete his course work in December 2009.

While at Binghamton, Edwin spent four semester interning with the New York State University Police at Binghamton. During that time, Edwin worked alongside patrol and communication officers, as well as with investigators.

While at John Jay, Edwin applied for and participated in the Naval Criminal Investigative Service's (NCIS) Honor's Internship Program for ten weeks during the summers of 2008 and 2009.

In a few weeks, Edwin will start working for the United States Marshal Service in the Cooperative Education Program. Upon successful completion of the mandatory hours, Edwin will be offered a full-time position as a Deputy U.S. Marshal.

Mark Liu, BS Psychobiology and Sociology '07

Since graduating, Mark has worked at the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, a world-renowned center for the progressive control and cure of cancer through patient care, research and education.
