College of Community and Public Affairs

The College of Community and Public Affairs is an undergraduate and graduate college located in Binghamton University's Downtown Center. Created in 2006, the college is composed of the Departments of Human Development, Public Administration, Social Work and Student Affairs Administration; CCPA is home to approximately 850 students.

The focal points of CCPA programs are local government and local government institutions, non-profit and social service organizations, and educational institutions throughout the Southern Tier. This local emphasis is an unusual focus for educational institutions, but it is critical to the future of governmental effectiveness. Local institutions deliver the most critical services to citizens – health and social welfare care, education, sanitation, transportation, and entertainment to name just a few. State and federal governments rely on local institutions for other critical functions such as public safety, immigration policy support, and others. In New York State, it is local governments and their citizens that bear the heaviest tax burdens and that will confront the difficult realities of governmental consolidation.

CCPA Program Descriptions

Human Development

Our major in Human Development focuses on meeting the educational needs of people interested in:

- * Children, Youth, & Families
- * Community Organizations, Leadership, & Advocacy
- * Social justice
- * Public/Non-Profit Service
- * Immigration Studies and the ever-expanding connections between local and global realities

Our courses challenge students to think about what it means to "walk a mile" in someone else's shoes, to learn how to communicate with people from many different backgrounds, to develop professional and organizational skills and to explore opportunities to put their knowledge into practice through service-learning experiences in the community.

Our faculty combine academic and professional strengths in human development and services in a variety of contexts involving education, counseling, health, and working with communities.

Public Administration

The Master of Public Administration Program prepares students for positions in the public service and non-profit leadership through community service, research and a program of study that facilitates intellectual development, promotes scholarship and integrates the theory and practice of public administration.

CCPA Program Descriptions

Social Work

The Department of Social Work's MSW Program prepares social workers for advanced generalist practice within an integrated community of scholars, practitioners and learners. The curriculum focuses on the full life span and teaches students skills necessary to utilize strengths-based models of intervention. The program prepares social workers to work with groups, organizations, and communities, as well as individuals and families, responding to the needs of a rural area where resources are limited.

Student Affairs Administration

The Student Affairs Administration program prepares student service practitioners and administrators for career opportunities in two- and four-year colleges and universities. The program is grounded in both student development theory, and the concept of theory-to-practice-to-theory. In performing the responsibilities of their selected roles, we want our graduates to be comfortable discussing relevant research in their work in Student Affairs and to feel qualified to contribute to knowledge production at a level appropriate to their experience.

From Metropolitan New York

Tappan Zee Bridge: Thruway 87 North, then take the Harriman Exit to Route 17 West. Take Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

George Washington Bridge: I-80 West to Route 380 North. Proceed on Route 380 North to I-81 North to Route 17 West. Take Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From New Jersey

New Jersey Turnpike North to Route 280 West, then take I-80 West to Route 380 North. Proceed to I-81 North to Route 17 West. Take Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From Southern New England and Downstate New York

NYS Thruway (87) to Exit 16 to Route 17 West. Continue on Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From Northern New England and Albany

I-88 West to I-81 South to Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From the West

Follow Route 17 East to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY Signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From the North

I-81 South to Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

From the South

I-81 North to Route 17 West, then take Route 17 West to Exit 70 South. Follow Route 201 and the SUNY signs, crossing bridge to Route 434 East. The main entrance to campus is your first right.

History of UDC Site

Prior to construction of the University Downtown Center, the Department of Anthropology undertook an archeological dig of the site on which the building was constructed. During the dig, two prehistoric settlements were discovered; a late archaic camp dating to 2500 BC, and a late woodland village AD 900-1100.

Prehistoric post wall mounts, at least one longhouse, and what is thought to be the earliest pit house in the North Eastern United States were located. Remnants of stone fire pits, numerous storage pits, cooking and decorative pots, and tools were uncovered that helped to date the site. Carbon dating is currently underway to determine a more specific timeframe for the site.

The original foundations from a bustling 19th century neighborhood built by prominent citizens of early Binghamton were uncovered. This block of homes included the Double Day House, the Klee home, and the Mather property. The artifacts found during this phase of the dig included dinnerware, jewelry, personal items, stoneware crocks, a water cistern and a privy. From the privy, it was possible to analyze the diets of those who lived during this timeframe. Overall, approximately 1000 artifacts were located.

The artifacts are now being catalogued by the Binghamton University Public Archeology Facility.

A Brief History of Binghamton University

The Forties

1946: A dinner at Binghamton's Arlington Hotel officially launched the beginning of Triple Cities College of Syracuse University to serve the needs of local veterans at the end of World War II. Dean Glenn Gardner Bartle served as the College's first dean.¹

1947-48: Harpur College offered 69 courses for the 800+ students to choose from. By the following school year, the college offered 237 courses, with the greatest growth in the Social Sciences and Humanities. There were 1,017 students enrolled, including 193 women.²

The Fifties

1950: Triple Cities College was accepted into the State University of New York. That year, the college was renamed "Harpur College" after Robert Harpur, an 18th century educator and landowner from Broome County.³

1958-1959: Dormitories and a gymnasium (now known as the East Gym) were built on the new Vestal campus. The gym housed basketball courts, bleachers for 1,500, a dance studio, an indoor firing range, handball courts and a swimming pool.⁴

The Sixties

March 1960: Approx. 100 Harpur College students picketed 3 local F.W. Woolworth stores to protest the company's policy of segregated lunch counters in the South.⁵

February 1961: The final move from Endicott to Vestal was completed.⁶

1960-1: By the 1960-61 school year, there were 74 faculty members and the average class had 15 students in each section.⁷

Fall 1961: Graduate study was launched at Harpur College during the fall semester, offering only one graduate course in English and another in math.⁸

The Sixties (continued)

1965: The State officially designated the campus as “The State University of New York at Binghamton.”⁹

1968-69: The Afro-American and African studies Department, the Black Student Union, a Latin American studies program and the Jewish Student Union were established.¹⁰

The Seventies

1970: The College’s School of Business (School of Management) was established.¹¹

Fall 1970: *The Colonial News*, the campus newspaper, was renamed the *Pipe Dream*, based on Eugene O’Neill’s *The Iceman Cometh*.¹²

1973: The College’s School of Nursing graduated its first class of 19 students. That year the School of Nursing was awarded accreditation by The National League For Nursing.¹³

1979: The School of General Studies and Professional Education was established, and later renamed the School of Education and Human Development in 1987.¹⁴

The Eighties

1983: The Thomas J. Watson School of Engineering and Applied Sciences was established, offering degrees in a variety of fields from electrical, mechanical, and industrial engineering to computer science.¹⁵

1983: The School of Management expanded its curriculum to include courses in International Business and more opportunities for international student and faculty exchanges.¹⁶

The Nineties

1990: The SUNY Board of Trustees appointed Lois DeFleur as the first female president of Binghamton University. DeFleur also became the first woman to become president of one of the four Ph.D. granting universities within the SUNY system.¹⁷

Fall 1994: By the fall semester of 1994, Binghamton University had 495 full-time faculty, eighty four percent of whom held a Ph.D and twenty of whom held University and/or Distinguished Professor appointments.¹⁸

1995: Binghamton University was ranked eighth among national universities in the U.S. News and World Report. In addition, the U.S. News and World Report ranked Binghamton University third in the nation for its educational efficiency.¹⁹

2000-2007

2003: The School of Education and Human Development received formal approval of a Master of Social Work program and admitted the first cohorts of full- and part-time students for the fall semester. The Division of Social Work was created to house the new program. The last cohort of students in the MSW/MASW degree graduated and the joint dual degree program was terminated.

July 1, 2006: The School of Education and Human Development became the School of Education and College of Community and Public Affairs including Departments of Human Development, Public Administration and Social Work.

August 20, 2007: Binghamton University officially opened the University Downtown Center (UDC), under the direction of Founding Dean Patricia Ingraham. The UDC houses the College of Community and Public Affairs, along with other educational programs and academic conferencing operations. The 74,400-square-foot facility has been designed with the most up-to-date classrooms, along with community spaces for student and faculty-sponsored initiatives and programs.
