Transfer Planning Guide**

Binghamton University offers the BA in Philosophy, Politics, and the Law (PPL). Students majoring in PPL at Binghamton choose between Track 1: Traditions of Western Law and Government or Track 2: American Law and Government. In Track 1, four designated courses are required in Philosophy, two courses in Latin; and four courses in History. Two additional electives are required. In Track 2, four designated courses are required in Philosophy, two courses in History, and two in Political Science. Four additional electives are required. For both tracks, at least six of the courses must be 300 level or above. Broome Community College offers courses in Philosophy, History, and Political Science that can fulfill some of the Philosophy, Politics, and Law elective and lower-level requirements (see below). In general, for BCC transfer students interested in the major, we recommend taking the equivalent courses identified below and completing as many General Education requirements as possible before transferring.

**Course Requirements and Broome Community College Course Equivalencies**

**Track 1: Traditions of Western Law and Government**

Students must take a total of 12 courses to fulfill the requirements for the major and must earn a grade of C– or higher in courses taken for the major; courses may not be taken Pass/Fail. Four courses must be in Philosophy (PHIL 201, 146 or 242, 345, and one elective); two courses must be in Latin; and four courses must be in History. The remaining two course electives may be selected from the list of designated courses for Track 1. Please note that at least 6 of the 12 courses must be 300-level or above, so only 6 BCC courses can transfer in.

## Track 2: American Law and Government

Students must take a total of 12 courses to fulfill the requirements for the major and must earn a grade of C– or higher in courses taken for the major; courses may not be taken Pass/Fail. Four must be in Philosophy (PHIL 146; PHIL 147, 148 or 149; PHIL 345; and PHIL 455, 456, 457 or 458); two must be in Political Science; and two must be in History. The remaining four course electives must be selected from the list of designated courses for Track 2. Please note that at least 6 of the 12 courses must be 300-level or above, so only 6 BCC courses can transfer in.

## General Education

In order to graduate, all students must meet the General Education requirements set by the State University of New York. As a public research institution in the SUNY system, we accept all general Education credits already awarded at other SUNY colleges.

Numerous courses in the Philosophy, Politics and Law major will help you complete General Education requirements in Social Science (N) and Global Interdependencies (G). While completing the Philosophy, Politics, and the Law major you will automatically fulfill the Social Science (N) and Humanities (H) requirements and the Harpur Writing Requirement, including courses in Composition (C), Oral Communication (O), or Joint Composition/Oral Communication (J) requirements. Students may transfer in a maximum of one composition course (C) and two writing (W) courses.

We recommend completing other General Education requirements including the Foreign Language requirement before transferring to Binghamton.
